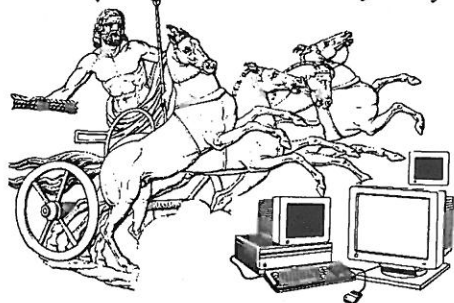

The Electronic Library: *Reality Check*

Fantasies of the electronic library as a general replacement for physical collections have mostly faded away. Crumbling in the face of scrutiny, it ignored real needs in favor of specious economics. Now what?

Recognizing that users are at the heart of successful library service, this talk will address some smaller solutions,

including RLG's new digital initiatives and activities at institutions such as the University of Michigan, the Library of Congress, and others. The workshop will explore some of the issues raised by new initiatives and the problems not yet addressed. It will take a look at some of the new media arising, some of the particularly intractable issues, and how tomorrow's complex libraries might evolve.

A humanities & social sciences services paged collection in first floor Smathers Library compact shelving, in a locked room adjoining the new Reading Room, serves as a "valuable-but-not-rare materials" storage site, enabling staff to make this material available to the public for circulation or in-house review within two hours of any weekday request made between 7:30 and 4:30.

New features include "in context" commands in a pull-down selection box and improved e-mail marking/unmarking commands.

A print/download function is forthcoming.

This interactive Web site will provide a single source of links to federal Web sites for all libraries in Florida.
