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P R E S I D E N T ' S MESSAGE

Following our very successful ACRL-Florida Chapter meeting in Tampa on February 27 with 253 persons in attendance, we have another important meeting planned as part of the Florida Library Association Conference (FLA) in Orlando on May 30, 1985.

The program title is *Library Networks, Networking and Resource Sharing: Multi-Type Cooperation*. It features Dr. JoAn Segal the ACRL Executive Director, Ms. Dale Canelas, Director of Libraries at the University of Florida, and Ms. Marlene Heroux of SOLINET. Dr. Segal will speak on Library Networks from a national perspective while Ms. Canelas will focus her presentation on RLIN/RLG a major academic resource sharing utility. Ms. Heroux will discuss SOLINET's programs, new developments and future network/resource sharing plans.

As with the Tampa meeting the proceedings will be taped and those members in attendance will receive a free copy on microfiche courtesy of University Microfilms International. There will also be an afternoon meeting and reception with Dr. Segal as the principal speaker discussing *ACRL-Its Structure, Programs, and Future*. Ebsco will sponsor the reception and all ACRL-Florida Chapter and FLA Academic and Special Librarians Caucus members are invited to attend and meet with Dr. Segal.

In Orlando we will also elect a new Vice-President/President-Elect for ACRL-FC and the FLA Academic and Special Libraries

Caucus. As outgoing Chapter President, I am chairperson of the nominating committee which is charged to find appropriate candidates for this important two year term. We also need three individuals to serve as Executive Board Members for 1985-86. Please contact me if you are interested in being considered for either position or want to nominate other qualified librarians. The 1985-86 President is Althea Jenkins of University of South Florida-Sarasota Campus.

With our successful meeting at Tampa, we now have a respectable treasury with which to move forward. The efforts and generous support of the Faxon Company and the southeastern sales representative, Judy Luther, should be recognized. We are program planning for 1985-86 and the events include:

* October 1985 meeting in the Ft. Lauderdale/Miami area for public use of on-line catalogs,

* a continuing education workshop for Jan./Feb. 1986 in Orlando,

* a program meeting on March 27-28, 1986 in Gainesville featuring (1) the FCLA and (2) status and standards for academic librarians; a topic to be discussed by Martha Friedman, former AAUP national President with support from ACRL national, and

* a program meeting at FLA in Tampa for May 1986.

Our newsletter will enter into its second year of publication with two issues projected.

It is an ambitious year, but the organization has had outstanding Officers and Board Members for 1984-85, and many will remain to serve you in that same first-rate capacity during 1985-86. REPORTS FROM THE FIELD

USF SCHOOL OF LIBRARY AND INFORMATION SCIENCE

Provost Dr. Gregory M. St.L. O'Brien designated the USF library science program as the School of Library and Information Science as of May 1, 1985. John McCrossan was named director of the school. Student diplomas for 1985 and future years will now read: USF School of Library and Information Science. The School is currently averaging 70 masters graduates a year. These librarians have found positions throughout the world (Germany, India, Guatemala, etc.) and throughout the USA.

FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY

Dedication of the Mildred and Claude Pepper Collection

U. S. Representative Claude Pepper is donating his extensive collection of official papers, documents, and memorabilia to the Florida State University. The Congressman's late wife, Mildred Irene Webster Pepper, also determined to donate her collection of papers and memorabilia, including her own paintings, to the University, which she attended as a student.

The collection, which will be expanded as Representative Pepper's public career continues, is believed to be one of the largest and most valuable of any member of Congress and his spouse. Pepper's career includes 14 years in the U.S.

Senate and now almost 19 years in the U.S. House of Representatives. The collection should serve as a magnet for students and scholars in the area of Public Affairs. In order to reap the benefits of having these materials, it is incumbent upon the Library and the University to provide suitable housing for this collection and to provide accompanying facilities which will encourage its use.

Congressman and Mrs. Pepper established an endowment fund to support the continued collection of relevant materials as well as to encourage the use of the collection. It is thus expected that the Pepper collection will be alive and growing for many, many years. The donation is being made to the University through the Florida State University Foundation, Inc. The Congressman has asked that the collection be named *Mildred and Claude Pepper Library*. The collection will be dedicated at an impressive ceremony at 2pm on May 15th in Ruby Diamond auditorium on the campus. Over 150 Congressmen and Senators are expected to attend, including the leadership of the Senate and House of Representatives. Dodd Hall, the Library for the Florida State College for Women, is being beautifully restored and will house the collection. Congressman Pepper's House and Senate offices are being replicated and furnished with many of the pieces from the original offices in Washington. Material for the opening exhibit have been selected and are being organized for display in the reading room.

Science Library Schedule to Begin Construction in Early Fall

Ground will be broken for the long awaited science library on FSU's campus this fall. The three story 79,000 square foot building has been in the planning stages for several years and will be a welcome addition to the library facilities on the Tallahassee campus. It will be located on the west side of the university adjacent to the science complex. Schweizer and associates of Orlando, the designers of the new addition to the Orlando Public Library, are the architects.

TALLAHASSEE COMMUNITY COLLEGE

The A-V Department at Tallahassee Community College is assisting in the production of video tapes covering the CLAST competencies for math. The tapes are in a television interview format with many question/answer interactions between program host, television instructor and student guests. The programs contain numerous graphics, illustrations, and examples. Each program includes an introductory statement of the specific competence to be discussed, a discussion of prerequisite skills, an introduction to problems similar to those that may appear on the CLAST (taken from the CLAST specifications), a demonstration of problem-solving strategies, and a closing review of the topics discussed during the program. The project staff has carefully screened the CLAST specifications to ensure that each program addresses the stimulus attributes, response

attributes, and typical format of problems to be included on the CLAST. Upon completion, these tapes will be available through Jack Binns of the Office of Instructional Television and Educational Materials, Department of Education.

The reference librarian, Mabel Shaw, is developing a course in library skills for TCC's Alternative Instruction Methods program. The course will introduce students to basic library services and materials. Through the AIM program, the student will be able to take the course at his or her own pace using a packet of materials, audio visual presentations and computer programs as a means of mastering the content.

PENSACOLA JUNIOR COLLEGE

In February, Derrie Roark gave a presentation on *Career Service Inservice Activities* at the Conference of the Florida Association of Staff and Program Development in Daytona Beach.

Pensacola Junior College has begun its self-study program for accreditation. Librarians will be on the various committees.

PJC is celebrating National Library Week April 15-19 by displaying faculty publications and works. The week will have a *grace period* for returning over-due books. The Student Government Association is sponsoring free ice cream for the students and the faculty has been invited to an open house with refreshments served in the lounge.

UNIVERSITY OF WEST FLORIDA

The *West Florida Union List of Serials*, which includes the holdings of 28 libraries from Panama City, Florida to Mobile, Alabama will be available at the beginning of 1985. In its seventh edition it is being revised by the UWF staff to incorporate new holdings of the member libraries. The staff is also revising some of the bibliographic entries to conform to recent cataloging changes. For more information contact Peggy Toifel (904)-474-2411.

The Reference Department at UWF is experimenting with the *on-line* ready reference service. In a situation that is judged to be more efficiently searched *on-line*, the librarian may spend up to \$10.00 a search to find answers to questions or to verify bibliographic information. This service has been very useful in verifying Interlibrary Loan requests in sources such as NTIS, GPO, etc., and answering questions about people or companies.

CHIPOLA JUNIOR COLLEGE

Chipola is in the process of establishing a continuing microcomputer committee. The committee will handle and enforce: (a) policy changes, (b) problems not covered by policy, (c) hardware evaluations, and (d) equipment purchases and suggestions for labs. The committee will consist of the director of management information service, director of learning resources center, electronics instructor(s), and other administrative and instructional positions directly affected by microcomputer policy. The committee has plans to eventually establish a separate budget to handle the expenses

of the microcomputer labs and the preventative and correctional maintenance of college-wide micros.

Chipola will start preparation for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Self-Study in the Fall of 1985. We would like to get copies of *Standard VI Library Self-Study Reports* that other community colleges would share with us.

Amnesty Week was observed during Community College Week, April 7-13. No fines were charged for books returned during this week. This was a chance to get books back to the Library without penalty. We were pleased with the response.

For the past two years, Chipola has sponsored a bookmark contest during *National Library Week*. We have obtained the cooperation of elementary, high school, and adult schools in the area served and it is advertised on the radio and in the newspaper. A gift for each winner is donated from local business concerns.

A student who has done the most reading is identified in the college News Letter during *National Library Week*.

UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

UF Retrospective Conversion with REMARC

The University of Florida began retrospective conversion using Carrollton Press's REMARC data base in January. Over 50,000 records have had search keys typed and sent to REMARC's Berkeley office. It is hoped that the project will be completed by January 1986.

Staff of Three Research Libraries visit UF for NOTIS/FOCUS Demonstrations

Louisiana State University, Vanderbilt University, and Cornell University have sent staff to UF to discuss the NOTIS/FOCUS system. Vanderbilt is in the process of implementing NOTIS and LSU and Cornell were comparing various systems with site visits. LSU decided to recommend NOTIS.

STETSON UNIVERSITY

The Library is experimenting with the use of a DEC Rainbow microcomputer to download search files in online searching. A communications software package, MITE 86, developed by Mycroft Labs in Tallahassee, is used to store the information during the search; Wordstar can be used to edit the search results off-line.

The Library has secured an institutional account with Knowledge Index to promote off-peak, low-cost searching for the end-user. A Stetson faculty workshop on online services, with particular reference to BI is planned for fall 1985.

EMBRY-RIDDLE AERONAUTICAL UNIVERSITY

The University will officially open its new library building, the Jack R. Hunt Memorial Library, on Monday, May 6, 1985. The new facility will provide additional student space, better integration of print and nonprint materials, and the basis for a possible expansion.

FLORIDA SOLAR ENERGY CENTER LIBRARY

The Florida Solar Energy Center (FSEC) Library is located at the FSEC in Cape Canaveral. The FSEC is associated with the State University System and is funded through the Board of Regents budget. FSEC Librarian, Iraida Rickling, reports that the library houses one of the largest collections on solar energy in the Southesast. Although primarily used by the FSEC staff of engineers and researchers, the FSEC library collection is also used by other energy researchers, solar industry members, and the general public (through interlibrary loan).

The FSEC library collection included 6,000 books, 14,000 documents, 20 periodical subscriptions, as well as numerous slides, films, and vertical file materials covering all aspects of solar energy and energy-related technologies. The library also provides online searches for FSEC staff in the Department of Energy's RECON data bases and the DIALOG data bases.

FSEC publishes a free quarterly newsletter, *The Solar Collector*, and many other publications targeted to the consumer and to solar energy industry members. FSEC publications are available free of charge from the FSEC Public Information Office, 300 State Road 401, Cape Canaveral, Florida 32920.

ROLLINS COLLEGE

Olin Library Dedication

On April 17, Rollins College dedicated the college's new \$4.7 million facility, the Olin Library. Ceremonies included

an academic procession, greetings on behalf of students, faculty and trustees, special recognition of the project's principal architect, James Gamble Rogers II of Winter Park, and the formal presentation of the building to Rollins president, Thaddeus Seymour by Olin Foundation president Lawrence Milas. As a special Centennial/Dedication gift to the community Rollins hosted a performance by the FLorida Symphony Orchestra in the college's fieldhouse that evening to top off the day's celebration.

After thirty years in the profession, Rollins Director of Libraries Pat Delks is overseeing a facility that she describes as the "most functional" and "most efficient" building that the architects and library staff could plan. Delks takes pride in the flexibility designed into the building. "Olin Library is a modular design," she explained. "Only ten percent is *fixed* in terms of function. We can adjust to specific needs as they arise. And we really tried to plan for multiple uses of space."

Much of the new library technology available at Olin is clearly visible on the main floor. A number of library catalog computer terminals are stationed there, with single terminals located on each of the other three floors. The electronic security system and automated check-out system are headquartered there. A bibliographic lab at the rear of the main floor is a multi-purpose room capable of accommodating lectures, class meetings, group

audio-visual presentations and seminars.

Personal study computers, located on the third floor, are tied into the campus VAX information system, currently housed in Bush Science Center. The study terminals give students and faculty instant access to data base systems as they work on papers and research projects in the library. The first floor houses the PDP/1144 computer which serves the entire building. The computer is behind a glass enclosure and is clearly visible "because it is such a vital part of the library operation," according to Delks.

But the fourth floor may be the most appealing spot in the building, especially to students. A special study lounge located there is one of the most inviting areas of the library. Equipped with throw cushions and a gallery wall for student art displays it is topped by a tower study room that provides a panoramic birds-eye view of the Rollins campus, Lake Virginia, and Winter Park. The cedar-panelled tower room offers 20 arched windows with spectacular views in every direction. The fourth floor is equipped with special window seating and bulletin boards where student organizations can post the latest news about people and events on campus.

The operating plan for design and construction of the library has become an important guidebook for the library faculty and staff as well as the architects and contractors. A similar written plan covers the physical move of more than

213,000 volumes from the old building to the Olin Building. According to Delks, Rollins has received requests for copies of the plan since it has proved so effective in the efficient use of time, people and dollars. The Rollins librarians welcome librarian colleagues from other libraries around the state to drop by and visit them in their new facility.

ROLLINS COLLEGE

Photographic Exhibit on James Gamble Rogers II

"Sixty years of Florida architecture," a photographic exhibit of the work of James Gamble Rogers, II, by his lifelong friend, photographer Harold Costain of Deland, will be on display at Rollins College in the Cornell Fine Arts Center through May 7th. The opening of the exhibit on April 17 coincided with the dedication of Rogers' latest architectural achievement, the Olin Library at Rollins.

Asked what the most important design criteria in the Olin project were, Rogers cited "harmony" and "scale."

"You must respect the adjacent buildings and outside spaces," Rogers said. "We like to have a harmonious style so that the structure will blend with other buildings nearby."

Rogers feels that the scale of the Olin Library approaches residential rather than commercial scale, but according to Rogers, the Olin Library differs from his residential designs in one important aspect. "Usually we carry out an

architectural theme on the interior as well as the exterior," he explained. But they have not attempted to carry the Spanish Renaissance of the exterior into the interior of Olin.

Rogers said that the Olin interior is as modern and functional as he could make it. Primary design considerations involved the interplay between books, computers, and people.

The exhibit of Rogers' work includes more than 40 photographs of private residences and public buildings. All were photographed over a 50-year period by Costain. Both the photographer and the architect are in their 80's. The exhibit is free and open to the public Tuesdays through Sundays.

UNIVERSITY OF CENTRAL FLORIDA

Library dedication

UCF dedicated its new library addition in a ceremony on February 10 which was attended by over 300 library friends, including faculty, community leaders, UCF library staff, and librarians from around the state. Dr. Robert Middlekauff, director of the Henry E. Huntington Library, Art Collection and Botanical Gardens in San Marino, California was the featured speaker. He spoke on the permanence of the written word and the critical role of the library as a collector and distributor of information.

The dedication festivities included an open house in the library with refreshments, music provided by student musicians from UCF's music fraternity, and tours of the new facility.

Library staff provided the walking tours where they explained and demonstrated the new technological systems utilized daily in the operations of the UCF Library. The *tour* was also available in a *technologically-innovative format* -- an interactive audio-visual presentation created especially for the dedication open house by the staff of UCF's Instructional Resources Center.

The four-story addition nearly doubled the floor area of the existing structure, increasing the total library space to over 220,000 square feet. Located adjacent to the rear of the library, the expansion is a simple, yet dramatic component of horizontal lines that lends a strong relationship to the earth and blends with the surrounding buildings.

Renovation of the existing structure focused on making more of the existing building space available for library use. Book shelves were designed to be placed at a forty-five degree angle to the column grid to provide more efficient utilization of space. Existing lighting throughout the structure was revamped, and the main entrance was lowered. The old driveways around the reflecting pool directly south of the library entrance were replaced with pedestrian walkways and a new plaza that preserves and enhances the environmental quality of the area was created.

Library Sponsors Essay Contest

The importance of reading in American life was the theme of a student essay contest spon-

sored by the UCF Library in recognition of National Library Week 1985. The contest was judged by members of the UCF English faculty and Rob Morse, a columnist with *The Orlando Sentinel*. Prizes totaling \$350 were awarded to the top three entrants. Winners were honored at an award ceremony and reception in the library on April 19.

Da Vinci Work Donated to Library's Special Collections

A 3-volume set of Leonardo da Vinci's *Corpus of the Anatomical Studies in the Collection of Her Majesty the Queen at Windsor Castle* now rests on permanent display in UCF Library's Special Collections Room thanks to the generosity of Dr. James Barsky, president of Academic Press. Dr. Barsky donated copy number 484 of the limited edition of da Vinci's work (only 970 were printed) to UCF in April.

This English edition, comprising two volumes of text and a Solander box of facsimile drawings, 200 folios, is valued at \$8,000 according to UCF Special Collections Librarian, Norbert St. Clair. St. Clair noted the exceptional quality of the reproduction achieved through the arrangement is matched by that of the accompanying text. "The text," he explained, "brings together for the first time the medical and art historical aspects of the drawings, the various publications which it replaces having all been confined to one of the aspects, to the almost total exclusion of the others." UCF Library's Special Collections Room is open to the public Monday-Fri-

day, from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm (except holidays and semester breaks).

Excellence in Librarianship Awards Made at UCF

The UCF Foundation's program to recognize excellence among faculty has now been augmented by an award to recognize excellence in librarianship. The first recipient of the librarianship award which was introduced last year was June S. Stillman, Head of Reference at the UCF Library. Stillman was singled out by her colleagues for her *professional excellence* and her devotion to providing library service throughout her 15-year career as Chief of UCF Library's Reference Department. Judith Young, recently named to head UCF Library's new Access Services Department was the recipient of the award this year. Young's achievements in bibliographic instruction were cited by her colleagues as a meritorious contribution to librarianship at UCF. An award of \$500 and a commemorative plaque is presented to the *Librarian of the Year* at an awards ceremony each spring on the UCF campus.

Serials Packets for Faculty Representatives Expedites Journal Order Requests

After several years of low budgets for books and journals, the UCF Library was able this year to make funds available for new journal subscriptions. Collection Development librarians, Carol Cubberly and Serials librarian, Mary Helen Howard, worked cooperatively on the project which provided for maximum ordering efficiency and

maximum communication between librarians and library faculty representatives.

The Library Serials Department provided packets for the Library Faculty Representatives. Each packet included (1) a list of journals currently received by the library and used in the discipline, (2) a report of the requests received during the last few years which could not be honored due to lack of funds, and (3) blank forms for submitting new requests. The departmental faculty were asked to evaluate the old requests, identify new desiderata, and submit updated requests to the Library with priorities indicated. As a result of the project, subscriptions for 378 new journal titles were ordered for the UCF library this year.

UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH FLORIDA

Civil Rights Document Collection Donation

Civil rights leaders Helen S. Saunders and Robert W. Saunders presented their extensive civil rights papers collection to the University of South Florida Library on February 4th in the Library Special Collections room.

The acceptance of the noted collection was made by USF Director of Libraries, Mary Lou Harkness. Remarks by Charles F. Wilson, vice-president in charge of legal affairs for the Jim Walter Corporation; Earl Shinholser, Southeastern regional director of the NAACP; Margrett Fork, assistant general counsel of the NAACP; and Dr. Steven Lawson of the USF Department of History followed the presentation.

The Saunders collection includes papers and photographs related to their distinguished careers with the NAACP, Helen Saunders in Tampa and Robert Saunders in Florida, said J. B. Dobkin, executive secretary of the USF Library Associates.

Strategic Planning

After many meetings and countless drafts, the USF faculty and administration will soon complete a strategic plan that will guide the University's future. A strategic plan is a pattern that integrates an institution's major programs, activities and policies into a cohesive whole and directs the institution's decisions and actions.

USF's preliminary plan includes a basic framework of a mission to make USF a premier institution of national prominence and four strategic directions to accomplish that mission.

The Library produced a six page planning document outlining the areas where we will support the strategic directions. Examples from that document include:

1. Enhance the quality of academic programs

Assign additional librarians to on-line searching so the service can be marketed to potential users.

2. Enhance the quality of the student experience

Advise Student Government representative in the selection of journals and books to be purchased with revenue from the Student Government's contribu-

tion (\$30,000) to the Library Endowment Fund.

3. Enhance quality and scope of research and scholarship

Increase the number of librarians so that assignments can include research and scholarship in addition to direct library service.

4. Enhance partnerships with public and private sector

Develop plan for informing industries of library resources and for making resources available to industry employees on a cost recoverable basis.

One of the University's objectives is to:

Enhance the complement of library resources to qualify (note: qualify rather than obtain) USF for membership in the Association of Research Libraries.

The Library's detailed plan will form the planning basis for the next five years.

TAMPA BAY LIBRARY CONSORTIUM

Plans for the first year's activities have been completed and presented to the State Library by Barbara Murphy, TBLC, Inc. President. The SUNLINE Committee, chaired by Lydia Acosta, is setting the stage for the first task, as study of the area's libraries by a consultant. That Committee is working on a request for proposal (RFP) which will detail exactly the requirements expected of a consultant and the task to be performed. More than 40 libraries in the TBLC area have already made commitments to

participate in the first year planning phase.

BARRY UNIVERSITY

Outreach programs with the extension center at Homestead Air Force Base were reinforced when Hugh Ripley, Head of Reference Services, and Bert Kleiman, the School of Education, carried a bibliographical instructional package to the base. The instruction was followed up with an hands-on experience at the home campus.

FLORIDA CENTER FOR LIBRARY AUTOMATION

As many of us know by now, a proposal for the establishment of the Florida Center for Library Automation (FCLA) was submitted to the Chancellor of the State University System on July 19, 1984 in response to action taken by the Legislature earlier in 1984. Legislative guidance indicated that an automation system for SUS Libraries should be "based on a plan approved by the Division of Library Services of the Department of State." Accordingly, the State Librarian, Barrett Wilkins, engaged King Research to study the proposal and make recommendations. It submitted its report on November 8, 1984 and then Wilkins sent his approval to the Chancellor on November 13.

By-laws of the Center were established, naming the organization, stating its purposes, membership and organizational relationships. A Board of Directors, composed of appointees from each SUS institution met during the fall and early winter to set policy and establish priorities. Max Willocks, from

the University of Florida Library, was appointed acting director until a permanent appointee could be found. James Corey was appointed director and began his duties on April 1, 1985. Office space has been obtained in Gainesville and FIRN telephone lines are being installed.

Site visits by Center staff for the purpose of planning hardware and communication lines installation were conducted between November 1984 and February 1985. Individual institutional installation plans and costs were submitted in March 1985.

A membership application has been submitted to the Research Libraries Group along with plans for terminals and the necessary telephone lines for each university library. C. James Schmidt will be in Tallahassee April 17 to negotiate the details of the contract.

The most important long-term activity of the Center has begun, i.e., the loading of the bibliographic databases of the SUS libraries. Considerable front-end programming will be necessary to convert the data into a public access catalog, the first product goal of the Center. The services to follow include a serials control function, support for library cataloging and acquisitions, an integrated circulation control function, an automated delivery system to augment intra-state interlibrary loan requests, training and user documentation, participation in other consortia as appropriate, and other services as technology and needs develop.

UNITED FACULTY OF FLORIDA

SUS Bargaining Agent reaches Agreement with BOR

The United Faculty of Florida, the Collective Bargaining Agent within the State University System reached an agreement on their 3 year contract with the Board of Regents. The UFF Chief Negotiator was Phyllis Husdon, librarian at UCF. Jeanene McNair, a librarian at USF, was also a member of the UFF Bargaining Team.

Many new and enhanced rights were made explicit in the BOR/UFF Agreement. Several of these focused on librarian issues. (The librarians number 252 in-unit plus another 48 out-of-unit within the SUS. Those out-of-unit are mainly high-administration and the health and law and agricultural librarians at the University of Florida. The out-of-unit librarians have no guarantee of the BOR/UFF Agreement rights.)

The salaries raises will range from 9.25% for current salaries above \$24,250 to 11.00% for current salaries below \$24,250. UFF's Senate passed a resolution to make certain that more money was available to the lower paid employees. Many librarians will benefit from this policy. However, the raises will range from 4.75% to 6.5% *if the upper quartile funds are not passed by the Florida Legislature.* Write your legislators urging funding of librarian salaries in the SUS.

Other benefits this year will include:

* merit criteria written by librarians will be implemented this year, and funded at a minimum of 1.25%

* 3 options for appointments periods are available, with approval of the university. Twelve-month, nine-month academic calendar, and an annual-leave-accruing variable length appointment period (between 9 and 12 months)

* it was made more explicit that professional responsibilities include non-scheduled activities, and the librarian determines the manner and place to carry these out.

* the *new Washington Formula* was recognized as the BOR's goal in staffing libraries

* the number of librarian sabbaticals, called professional development leaves, were increased

* child care leave was extended to biological parents, not just pregnant employees, or when a child is placed in a home pending adoption. The leaves are still without pay, but the librarian can extend the leave on a part-time basis for up to one year

* librarian's participation in library governance was made explicit in the decision to hire a candidate for a professional vacancy

* The BOR recognized its obligation to prohibit sexual harassment

* phased retirement is available for 5 years after retirement, here the librarian re-

ceives their retirement benefits and is offered employment for one term each year. During the second year the librarian is eligible to receive both their retirement benefits and university pay if employed that term. (It really gets complicated, but believe me - it's a good deal!)

ACRL CHAPTER'S COUNCIL MEETING

-- a report

The ACRL Chapters Council met during ALA Mid-Winter in Washington, D.C. on January 5-6, 1985. Both President Peter Malanchuk and Vice-President/President Elect Althea Jenkins attended the orientation and business meeting. The most important item on the business meeting agenda was the Special Programming Budget. The Council had approximately \$14,000 to allocate to individual Chapters to support programs during 1986. Fourteen Chapters presented proposals by November 1, 1984 for funding. Only six of these proposals met all criteria for funding. Florida's ACRL chapter was one of the Chapters funded.

ACRL - FLORIDA CHAPTER

Library Director Lydia Acosta and the University of Tampa did an excellent job in hosting the *first FLA-ACRL/FC Conference*. The conference theme: *Advances in Developments of Automated Library Systems in Florida* drew more than 250 participants. The speakers included Barratt Wilkins, State Librarian, Frank Rogers, Director of University of Miami Library, R. Max Willocks, acting Director of Florida Center for Library Automa-

tion, and Sue Kennedy of University Microfilms International. They discussed the existing and future developments in the use of new technology to expand information access and improve services.

The FLA-ACRL/FC Board is extremely pleased with the reception that this conference received from librarians around the state. Lydia Acosta and her staff transcribed the Conference notes and UMI is preparing microfiche copies for distribution.

President Malanchuk held a brief business meeting prior to the conference program on February 27th where the ACRL/FC By-laws were presented to the membership and approved.

FLA - ACRL/FC EXECUTIVE BOARD NOTES

The FLA-ACRL/FC Executive Board met at the Stetson University Dupont-Ball Library on March 22, 1985.

President Peter Malanchuk called the meeting to order at 11:00 am. The president received Lydia Acosta's report on the FLA-ACRL/FC conference. The report that the chapter's special program proposal for \$1,580.00 was approved by the ACRL Board at the Mid-Winter Meeting and will be officially announced at the Annual Conference in July.

Plans for the May 30, 1985 meeting in conjunction with the FLA Academic and Special Librarians Caucus were discussed. Malanchuk will contact Dale Canelas, Director of University Libraries at the University of

Florida, Marlene Heroux, SOLINET and JoAn Segal from ACRL to discuss final program plans. EBSCO has committed support to sponsor a reception for JoAn Segal between 3:00 pm and 5:00 pm on May 30th. We want to see every one there!

Malanchuk will chair a nominating committee to nominate Florida ACRL officers and board members for 1985/86. A number of names were suggested. If anyone has suggestions, please contact Malanchuk soon. The board consists of the four officers, the previous president, and seven others, for a maximum of twelve.

The next special program with national ACRL funding will be March 27-28, 1986, in Gainesville. Malanchuk has checked on holding the program at either the University Center Hotel across from Shands, at the south end of the campus, or at the Reitz Union. The Board decided to check further on using the University Center Hotel and just reserving a few rooms at the Union for those who might wish less expensive accommodations. The program will include a report on FOCUS and FCLA and a tour of the FCLA facilities. Martha Friedman will speak on standards for academic librarians. Malanchuk will explore the possibility of having University of Florida Academic Vice-President Bryant speak on librarians' status. It was suggested that UMI might be interested in setting up some equipment displays as they will be providing microfiche of the proceedings.

A Friday meeting in conjunction with the community college

group in October 1985 is being explored. A site in south Florida is preferred in order to spread the programs geographically. The program will focus on bringing the online environment to the patron, including online catalogs, bibliographic instruction, etc. Vendors may be brought in to demonstrate equipment and software.

The next meeting of the Executive Board will be June 14, 1985.

Dr. William Summers

Dr. William Summers, 52, the former state librarian of Florida (1965-1969) will return to Tallahassee to become dean of the Florida State University School of Library and Information Studies, beginning July 1.

Summers, dean of the College of Library and Information Science at the University of South Carolina, will succeed the retiring Dr. Harold Goldstein, who has served as dean since 1967.

Dr. Summers, a native of Jacksonville and a 1955 graduate of Florida State, received a master's degree in library science in 1959 and a PhD in 1973, both from Rutgers University. In 1971, he joined the faculty of the University of South Carolina as professor and assistant dean. He was named dean of the college in 1976. Prior to his present position, he served in libraries in Florida, New Jersey and Rhode Island.

Dr. Logan received her PhD and MLS at Case-Western Reserve University, and an AB in economics at Oberlin.
