Eckerd College: Larry Hardesty, Director of Library Services, compiled and edited User Instruction in Academic Libraries: A Century of Selected Readings (Scarecrow, 1986), with John P. Schmitt (College of Charleston) and John Mark Tucker (Purdue University) and a Foreword by Evan Farber (Earlham College). Hardesty also has written a chapter titled "The Role of Classroom Faculty in Bibliographic Instruction" in Teaching Librarians to Teach: On-The-Job Training for Bibliographic Instruction, (Scarecrow, 1986) edited by Alice S. Clark and Kay F. Jones (University of New Mexico). Jamie Hastreiter, Coordinator of Systems Planning and Serials and Hardesty have co-authored a forthcoming publication in Collection Building titled "Mathematics Periodicals in Selected Liberal Arts Colleges." Hastreiter, with Hardesty and David Henderson, Coordinator of Instruction Services, have compiled the forthcoming CLIP Notes publication, Periodicals in College Libraries, which should be available by the ALA Conference in June. University of Florida: Robert Singerman (Price Library of Judaica) has published Jewish Serials of the World: A Research Bibliography of Secondary Sources (Greenwood Press, 1986). The 3,041 citations are based in a large part on the holdings of the Price Library. Robert Singerman has also published "The Jew as Racial Alien: The Genetic Component of American Anti-Semitism", in David A. Gerber, ed., Anti-Semitism in History (University of Illinois Press, 1986), pp. 103-128.

University of Miami: Edited by Lyn MacCorkle and covering the years of 1984 and 1985, the University of Miami has issued its first annual Bibliography of U.M. Faculty Publications. The listing includes books, journal articles, and technical reports authored by teaching and research personnel from all UM campuses. Esperanza Varona was a panelist at the Fourth Annual meeting of the Society of Florida Archivists held last year. Sara Sanchez presented a workshop on the Cuban Information System Project at the SALALM (Seminar on the Acquisition of Latin American Library Materials) Conference in Berlin in 1986. The meeting was held at the Iberoamerikanisches Institute, a Research Institute and Library for Latin America, Spain and Portugal. The workshop dealt with the Cuban Information System Project, a highly specialized interdisciplinary collection of databases, focusing on Cuba and Cubans living abroad, particularly aimed at assisting the researcher of post-1959 Cuba.

North Florida Junior College: Lu Sands, Library Director, is the author of an article "Jesse Stuart: Lessons from the Kentucky Hills" published in Journal of Rural and Small Schools (Fall 1986). She had an exhibition of her paintings in the NFJC Art Gallery in February 1987.

Seminole Community College: Laurie S. Linsley authored "The Dual Job Assignment in Law School Libraries," in Legal References Services Quarterly 7(1): 51-54.

St. Leo College: Mary Ferguson delivered a program entitled "Four Score Encounter: Creative Programming for the Elderly," at the Public Library Association Conference in St. Louis on April 4. The hour-long program consisted of several program packages for elderly people.

NEWS FROM THE FIELD

Buildings

Broward Community College: After a summer in which service at the North Campus Library in Coconut Creek was diminished while adjacent space, not previously available for library use, was being remodeled, full service was restored this fall and further extended to include being open Saturday afternoons. The additional space almost doubled the seating capacity, greatly improved the periodicals area, and provided greatly needed office space for staff members.

University of Florida: Beginning February 1987, the various scattered science collections of the University were moved into the new Central Science Library. The new library has over 90,000 square feet of assignable space, with 24 miles of shelving on 5 levels. Capacity of the new building is over 800,000 volumes. Merging into this space are the collections from agriculture, chemistry, engineering, mathematics, physics and astronomy. Maps and science materials previously in the university's main library are merged into the science collection. Librarians from Florida are invited to visit the new facility.

Pensacola Junior College: Last summer the staff of Pensacola Junior College's Milton Campus met with local dignitaries to dedicate the recently completed facility which included a modern Learning Resources Center.

University of South Florida at Sarasota, New College: The USF/Sarasota/New College Library dedication was held November 1, 1986. More than 700 people attended and toured the new facility. If you haven't seen the building - please plan to visit.

Library Associations

Central Florida Librarians' Association: Met at the University of Central Florida Library in November with presentations by Laurie Linsley, Meg Scharf, Marilyn Snow, and Jeannette Ward. Demonstrations and hands-on experience with DIALOG and LUIS were provided.

West Coast Library Consortium (WELCO): Held a one-day workshop last fall on October 22 entitled: "Professionalism Makes a Difference." 175 attended. Cecil Beach, Shirley Aaron (FSU) and Ed Pierce (editor-emeritus of the Sarasota Herald Tribune) were among the speakers. The workshop was held at the Sudakoff Center on the USF/Sarasota Campus.

Programs and Services

Broward Community College: In response to Florida International University and Florida Atlantic University upper division course being offered at the Central Campus, the library has extended its opening hours to include eight hours on Saturdays. Through the good offices of FIU and FCLA, the Central Campus library has received two LUIS terminals. As a further service to FIU and FAU students, special funding has made available about \$190,000 for library materials in support of FIU/FAU courses offerings at BCC Central Campus. While the selection of materials under this funding was done by FIU and FAU personnel, the ordering and processing of the material was done by BCC.

University of Central Florida: Congressman Bill Nelson presented the UCF Library with a UCF pennant that he carried with him on the space shuttle flight January 12-18, 1986. The UCF pennant, a Certificate of Authenticity signed by Bill Nelson, and the original NASA photograph of the seven member crew of the Space Shuttle Mission 61-C are on display in the UCF Library. "Flame of Hope," a nine-foot bronze sculpture by Mexican artist, Leonardo Nierman, will be placed near the entrance to the UCF Library next Spring. The sculpture's cost of \$30,400 will be paid by the state of Florida in accordance with the 1979 law which appropriated funds for art work in new public buildings. The library's art selection board chose Nierman's sculpture from 59 entries. Anne Marie Allison, Library Director, and Lucille Lloyd, Associate University Librarian, Documents, were on the board along with representatives from the community, university administration, faculty, and student body.

Chipola Junior College: The Learning Resources Center has entered a cooperative venture with Florida A & M University. The project proposes a two-part strategy for increasing usage of network and on-line systems in schools and colleges. Training, equipment, subscriptions, and software will be provided for the local areas served by CJC and FAMU.

University of Florida: With the opening of the Central Science Library, all interlibrary loan requests for University of Florida science materials should be forwarded to the OCLC location code FUA address, even if OCLC indicates that the item was cataloged at FUG. New address for science materials: ILL, Central Science Library, University of Florida, Gainesville, FL 32611; telephone 904-355-8551; OCLC symbol FUA.

Following a six-month review of all binders east of the Mississippi River who belong to the Library Binding Institute, Heckman Bindery of North Manchester, Indiana was chosen to be the periodicals binder for all of the University's libraries. For further information about the selection of Heckman, contact Frank Orser, chair of the committee that conducted the review.

Florida Institute of Technology: FIT has received a \$50,000 matching grant from Edyth Bush Charitable Foundation, Inc. to complete retrospective conversion of its card catalog. The grant is based on an incentive arrangement under which the Foundation provides FIT with one dollar for each dollar FIT raises from other sources.

Florida International University: The FIU Libraries host the Cuban Exile History Project and related archives under the direction of Dr. Miguel Bretos who has recently moved into the Special Collections area of the Athenaeum. Work will focus on oral history and on archival collections relating to business and commercial history, linguistic and literary history, and oral history relating to the "man on the street." With the cooperation of Dr. Rodolfo Cortina, Director of the Multilingual and Multicultural Center, within whose area this project falls, an agreement was established with the University of Miami Library which will minimize duplication of effort as both institutions seek to preserve the heritage of the Cuban Exile milieu.

Florida State University: The largest single endowment in the history of Strozier Library has been established by the family of the late John M. Shaw through a contribution of \$100,000 given by Lillian R. Shaw, wife of Mr. Shaw, and their children, John and Cathmar. The gift qualifies for \$50,000 in matching funds from Florida's Major Gifts Challenge Program. Shaw, who died in March 1984, served as a voluntary curator of the Childhood in Poetry Collection at Strozier Library from 1960 to 1969. He had started the collection by donating more than 6,000 volumes of English and American poetry, and it now contains about 25,000 volumes. Charles E. Miller, director of the University Libraries, said the generous contribution will ensure that the collection continues to grow and that it is available and utilized.

Hillsborough Community College: Through use of IBM PCs and VAX terminals, library automation is well underway. They are also using full MARC records (unique feature) to do retrospective conversion and cataloging.

LUIS: As of this past September all State University System library patrons not only have access to an expanded computerized catalog providing information on library collections at their local institutions but through that same online catalog have access to information on the collections of the entire State University System. The online catalog, called LUIS, or Library User Information System, is available at more than 50 Florida sites in 20 cities. Dial-up access is also available for users in their homes, offices, public libraries and community colleges. As with the card catalog, LUIS can be searched by author, title and subject. At this time, there are over 4 million records for books, maps and audio-visual materials in the state-wide data base. In addition, the capability exists for adding automated

acquisitions, circulation and serials control in the future. LUIS has, therefore, the potential to become a totally integrated system for library automation. This is a project of the Florida Center for Library Automation (FCLA), an SUS agency. FCLA also has been meeting with representatives of the nine State University System schools to plan for further implementation for the circulation module.

University of Miami: Sheila Jaeger, Government Publications librarian has developed software to produce an enhanced keyword index of the International Governmental Organizations. The Library's third annual Open House, held October 7 and 8, attracted a record attendance of 1,025. A dozen booths set up in Brockway Lecture Hall provided a sampler of library services and functions. Also on display was a large collection of historical materials demonstrating UM's past and present Pan American connections.

Miami-Dade Community College, Wolfson Campus: The campus, in downtown Miami, again played host in November to the Miami Book Fair International with 250 or more exhibitors, publishers and authors on campus. Campus library personnel are heavily involved with librarian Juanita Johnson heading a virtual army of volunteers from the community and the college. "The community is so enthusiastic about the event we get twenty or more calls every time a notice about the Fair's need for help appears in the newspapers," according to Johnson. The Miami Book Fair International '86 celebrated its third year by expanding the street fair segment from Saturday and Sunday to three days. Another first was a Young Author's Conference in cooperation with the Dade County Public Schools. Authors this year included Pulitzer Prize winning cartoonist Jules Feiffer and Nobel Prize winner Czeslaw Milosz.

North Florida Junior College: Kathy Sale, Reference Librarian, taught a community education course at Madison related to the Ramses II exhibition in Jacksonville, Florida.

Pensacola Junior College: Virginia Thomas is first alternate on the OCLC Users Council for the New Orleans meeting.

Rollins College: The past two years at Rollins College's Olin Library have been a period of transition. Over 60,000 books have been reclassified from Dewey to Library of Congress. In October, a booktruck brigade of over 120 volunteers shifted books from one floor to another as the LC books outgrew their space. The reclassified books have been barcoded and the barcode attached to the bibliographic record in the CLSI databases. In addition, over 130,000 records have been converted to machine-readable form and entered into the database. The CLSI circulation system also started in early 1987. The on-line public access catalog (CL-CAT) for which Rollins is planning to be a beta site is also

expected to be operational by next year. This online catalog will provide additional access by keywords. Overseeing these projects are Terence Sebright, Director of Technical Services, and Edna McClellan, Head of Cataloging.

University of South Florida at St. Petersburg: Sam Fustukjian, library director, met with Governor Graham in December and received copies of oral history tapes dealing with the life of Nelson Poynter. This is part of a collection developed for the State Archives.

Southeast Florida Library Information Network: Several librarians from Florida International University, Broward Community College, Florida Atlantic University, Miami-Dade Community College, and the University of Miami are participating in the implementation of the SEFLIN network. SEFLIN is the Southeast Florida Library Information Network which links the 15 member libraries via telefax and courier. A SEFLIN-sponsored workshop held at the University of Miami on September 15 was attended by 75 southeastern librarians.

IDEA EXCHANGE

Chipola Junior College: The Learning Resources Center will be remodeled in 1987-1988. All books, materials, and equipment will be moved to another building. Suggestions would be appreciated.

CHAPTER CONFERENCE AND PROGRAM REPORT

Fund-Raising for Academic Libraries

On September 25th and 26th the Florida ACRL Chapter held its fall conference at the University of Florida. Over fifty individuals attended to hear Dr. David Kaser, Distinguished Professor of Library and Information Science of Indiana University, give the Thursday evening keynote address titled "The Gold Touch; or, The Gentle Art of Raising Money."

The conference continued Friday morning with Donna Parrino (Director of Development, University Library at the University of South Florida) discussing the "The Role of the Development Office in Library Fund-Raising." Among Donna's suggestions was to look for that something that gives our libraries a special appeal to potential donors. Meg Scharf (Coordinator of Library Information Network Exchange, University of Central Florida) provided a wide range of ideas in her talk "Fees, Friends, and Fund-Raising." Randy Akers (Associate Director for Program Development, Florida Endowment for the Humanities) generously shared ideas on how to obtain funds from granting agencies in his talk "Key Considerations in Grant Writing for Funding Agencies."

The first afternoon session consisted of a series of ideas briefs presented by Darleen Abbott (Pensacola Junior College), Jamie Hastreiter (Eckerd College), Robert Singerman (University of Florida), Terry Sebright (Rollins College), and Sidney Ives (University of Florida). Fund-raising ideas presented ranged from a few thousand dollars raised from the sale of weeded journals to hundreds of thousands of dollars raised to support special collections and book endowments. The conference was wrapped up with a series of brainstorming sessions and summaries. A special thanks to all the speakers and to Richard Bennett and to Peter Malanchuk for all their hard work as co-chairs of the local arrangements committee. Jim Tucker of Congressional Information Service, Chuck Leachman of EBSCO, and Howard "Monk" Meyer of Newton Seating Company are to be thanked for their support of the conference.

State-Wide Library Automation in Florida: An Overview, An Inside View, And An Outside View

On May 7th, the Florida ACRL Chapter held its program as part of the FLA Conference. An estimated 150 individuals filled a packed room to hear progress reports on the various projects in Florida and Barbara Markuson, Executive Director of INCOLSA, talk on "An Outside View of Statewide Library Automation in Florida." In addition to Barbara's talk, Freddie Mellichamp, Chief of Interlibrary Cooperation, Florida Division of Library Services, spoke on "An Overview of Statewide Automation in Florida;" Kathleen Imhoff, Head of the Office of Planning of SEFLIN, talked on "Automation Activities at SEFLIN;" Michele Dalehite, Assistant Director of Program Development, FCLA, spoke on "The Florida Center for Library Automation;" and Bob Martin, SUNLINE Project Manager, spoke on "Automation Activities in the Tampa Bay Library Consortium." A special thanks to all the speakers and to John Racila of American Bindery - Dobbs and John Ferrell of Information Access for support of the program.

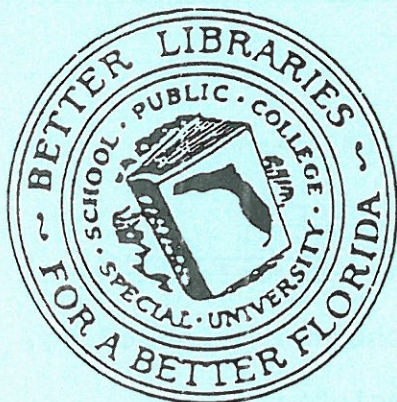
